A nonprofit organization that serves homeless/near homeless children and their families in a five-star early childhood education setting with a Trauma-Informed Care designation. She has spent twenty years working with children, families, educators, and administrators across the P-20 education pipeline. She is the Principal Investigator for numerous programs that provide a foundation to break the cycle of poverty. She championed Jardin's expansion into the Hatch Valley

Community. Dr. Adames believes in holistic, strengths-based, and trauma-informed practices that empower children, youth, and families to experience personal growth and success.



Juan "Ricky" Araiza

Juan "Ricky" Araiza (he/him), is an artist and educator from Las Cruces, NM who has been a member of New Mexico State University's community since 2014. As an artist, his work aims to raise questions on identity, the body, and borders both material and metaphorical. As a teacher, his courses (ranging from film studies to masculinities to comics as literature) seek to help students develop critical awareness on issues related

Honor Beeson



Her co-edited book with Cristina Morales, *Frontera Madre(hood): Brown Mothers Challenging Oppression and Transborder Violence at the U.S.-Mexico Border* (University of Arizona Press) will be published in 2024. Bejarano is also the Principal Investigator for the NMSU College Assistance Migrant Program.



Mary A. Benanti

After a 20-year career in journalism and covering politics in Texas, Colorado and Washington DC, Prof Benanti returned to New Mexico State University. With a Master of Arts in Government, and a thesis "Women, Politics and Media," she was hired as the first fulltime College Professor of the evolving Women's Studies dept. Her class based on her thesis research was co-taught with then N.M. Lieut. Gov. Diane Denish. After retiring as

Associate Professor, Benanti continued to teach at NMSU part time and continues at the University of Texas at El Paso in the Osher Lifelong Learning program with classes on her specialty: The Politics of Sex, Gender and Sexualities.

Johana currently serves as Mayor Pro Tem on the Las Cruces City Council. MPT Bencomo has focused on policy priorities that aim at addressing systemic inequities. MPT Bencomo currently works with Women's Democracy Lab, where she gets to support other Women of Color in elected office. Prior to this she served as the Executive Director for NM CAFé. Johana has committed to a career in social justice and building power with historically excluded communities. Johana migrated to the United States with her family when she was 8 years old. She earned her BA in Government and a MSW from NMSU.



Dylan McCarthy Blackston

Dr. Dylan McCarthy Blackston received his Ph.D. in Gender and Women's Studies from the University of Arizona, an MA in Women's Studies from Georgia State University, and a BFA in Photography with a minor in Women's Studies from the University of Georgia. His research and teaching are in the areas of trans studies, trans ecologies, feminist studies, critical life and animal studies, sexuality studies, and visual culture studies. He is co-editor of the recently published collection, *The Transgender Studies Reader Remix* (Routledge 2022), and is currently working on his first monograph, *Trans*plantations of Life: How Capital Makes and Changes Kinds*.



Julia T. Brown

Julia is a graduate of Oklahoma State University and the University of Oklahoma, College of Law, where she was law class President. Ms. Brown is a Regional Rep for the New Mexico State Economic Development Department. Julia's other work experience includes having served as City Manager for Sunland Park, NM; County Manager for Dona Ana County, NM; and Vice President and CRA Officer for Charles Schwab Bank. Julia served both as an enlisted soldier and an Army Judge Advocate General's Corps (JAG) Officer and retired with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.

Dr. Bustamante is the Executive Director of the Colonias Development Council, a position she has held for almost 27 years. She retired as Doña Ana County Probate Judge in December 2022, having served two terms. She was a faculty member of NMSU and co-founder of the original Women's Studies Program in the early 1990's. She spent her formative adolescent years working in agricultural labor in the Yuma, Arizona, area, as well as making the annual treks to work in California in the summers. Her work has

Ms. Contreras is originally from the state of Chihuahua, Mexico. She has her degree in Accounting from NMSU and is the current Assistant Director of the Colonias Development Council. She is an accredited legal representative for the ISIF program and oversees over 14 employees who address a multiplicity of immigration services, including the legal services office, the promotoras de Apoyo familiar, and

the citizenship preparation classes. She also functions as the primary chief financial officer for the organization.



Becky Corran

Becky is a Professor of Public Health at DACC and a City Councilor for Las Cruces. Her courses and policy focus on community health and infrastructure that promotes the health of people and the environment. She serves on the EPA's Local Government Advisory Committee and has consulted with the CDC on Project Firstline. With twenty

years of experience in health and education, Becky has worked with diverse communities and focused on justice, access and equity. Specifically, she's worked on LGBTQ+ advocacy; animal rescue; and farmworker health. She currently serves on the Board for Roadrunner Food Bank of New Mexico.



Doreen Gallegos

Doreen was first elected to New Mexico House of Representatives 2012-current. She has served in several leadership positions in her role as a Legislator and as an Executive Director. She is the Chair of the House Commerce and Economic Development Committee, a Member of the House Taxation & Revenue Committee, a Member of the House Rules & Order of Business Committee, and a Designee on the Legislative Finance Committee. She also served as House Majority Whip from 2018 to 2022. She has served as

the Executive Director of Mesilla Valley CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) since 1999. She holds a BSW and MSW in Social Work from New Mexico State University. She is dedicated and passionate about advocacy and being a public servant. Doreen is married to Scott Scanland, has a son, Nicolas Gallegos, and two dogs, Sophie & Truman.



Rose Garcia

Rose Garcia is the Executive Director of Tierra del Sol Housing Corporation, a New Mexico nonprofit corporation and a leading regional affordable housing and community development organization. She has served in that role for over forty years.



Carrie Hamblen

Carrie is originally from El Paso, Texas where she earned a Bachelor's Degree in Broadcast Journalism from the University of Texas at El Paso. She earned a Master's Degree in Communication Studies and a Masters of Public Administration from NMSU. For 20 years, Carrie was the Morning Edition host and Operations Manager for KRWG, the NPR affiliate at NMSU. She has served as President of PFLAG Las

Cruces, Co-Chair of Southern NM PRIDE, and Board President of the Mesilla Valley Community of Hope. She is the CEO/President of the Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce. In 2020, Carrie was elected to serve as State Senator for District 38.



Neil Harvey

Neil Harvey is the NMSU Government department head, whose main areas of interest are politics in Mexico and Latin America, particularly the role of social movements in the struggle for democracy and new forms of political representation. Dr. M. C. Jonet, Associate Professor of Gender & Sexuality Studies, is the founding co-Director/Executive of Feminist Border Arts (FBA), a groundbreaking public scholarship initiative the humanities-arts, featuring the Feminist Border Arts Film Festival. FBA employs research-creation to generate and disseminate new knowledge through practice-based strategies. Jonet's scholarship focuses on transmedia queer and feminist cultural production, pedagogies, and FBA. 
education at NMSU, and runs the NIH-funded NM-INBRE student research experience program, providing research experiences to undergraduates across New Mexico.

Dr. Patti Wojahn, emeritus professor of rhetoric and professional communication, has been involved in Gender and Sexuality Studies and a range of social justice issues since arriving at NMSU in 1999, taking part in the planning committee to move Women's Studies from a certificate program to a disciplinary major, and occasionally teaching in the program. She retired as department head of Interdisciplinary Studies, home to Gender and Sexuality Studies from 2015-2021. For many years, she played an active role in the Borderlands Writing Project, an outreach

program bringing together our region's K-12+ teachers invested in supporting students and their learning environments in just and effective ways.
