What is Gender & Sexuality Studies?

- status, and disability
- of power and difference

An inter- and multidisciplinary field of inquiry that examines gender and sexual identity as fundamental categories of analysis that always exist in interrelationship with other categories of identity and difference, like race, class, national

Identifies and theorizes structures of power and inequality

Emphasizes the insights and methods produced in feminist theory, queer theory, transgender theory, other social theories

Puts feminist, queer, and other socially engaged critical theories and practices in conversation with research in the humanities, arts, social sciences, and natural sciences

What is Gender & Sexuality Studies?

- Gender and Sexuality Studies equips you with an expanded understanding of contemporary society, structures of power and inequality, forward-thinking approaches to equity, new futures, and conceptions of justice

What is **Cultural Studies?**

- An academic field grounded in critical theory
- It generally concerns the **political** nature of popular contemporary culture
 - It is in this regard distinguished from cultural anthropology
 - Researchers concentrate on how a particular medium or message relates to matters of:
 - ideology
 - identity
 - social class
 - nationality
 - ethnicity
 - sexuality
 - gender
 - even species



What is **Cultural Studies?**

Cultural studies is **interdisciplinary**, studying cultural phenomena by combining methods and insights from:

- sociology
- social theory
- anthropology
- political theory
- history
- literary and cinema theory
- media theory
- communication studies
- semiotics
- philosophy

Thus, cultural studies seeks to understand the ways in which meaning is generated, disseminated, and produced through various practices, beliefs, institutions, and political, economic, or social structures within a given culture



What is Media Studies?

An academic field that deals with the content, form, history, effects, and political implications of various media and technologies

Approaches include:

- the critique of artistic styles and aesthetic forms (genre, narrative, etc.)
- the study of the production process (e.g. technologies, markets, etc.)
- cultural analysis (of ideological effects, reception and consumption, etc.)

Media studies draws on traditions including:

- communication studies
- philosophy
- literary theory
- psychology
- political science
- sociology
- anthropology
- social theory
- art history and criticism
- film theory
- semiotics
- performance theory

and especially – in our case – cultural studies and feminist, queer, and transgender theory along with other socially transformative iterations


